Past, Present and Futures: Chicago Mercantile Exchange; by Jeffrey Rodengen (2008)

<u>Past, Present and Futures</u> celebrates the rich history of the CME and its innovative contributions to the futures industry. The book spans the Exchange's 1919 incorporation through the landmark merger of CME and the Chicago Board of Trade in 2007.

2. Enjoy a Film Night with movies with a Trading Theme.

What could be better on a winter night than watching a flick about trading? In previous <u>Resolutions</u>, we've featured such classics as *Trading Places*, *Wall Street* and *Limit Up*. This year our picks are *Rogue Trader* and *Traders*.

Rogue Trader is the true story of Nick Leeson, Barings Bank's trading floor manager at the SIMEX (Singapore Monetary Exchange). Using Baring's money to trade his own account, Leeson racks up losses exceeding 800 million pounds, forcing the investment house into bankruptcy.

Traders was a dramatic television series which ran from 1995-2000. The series focused on the business and personal affairs of the fictional investment banking firm of Gardner Ross. The cast of characters included the head trader making money through short-term risky trades, the brilliant but disturbed derivatives and the head currency trader from a Mennonite-like background.
